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INTRODUCTION

THE JUDITH AND MARVIN HERB FAMILY SIMULATION CENTER is one of SWFL's largest simulation centers that is truly multidisciplinary. The center is within a 12,000-square-foot at NCH in Naples, FL., and focuses on training healthcare professionals to acquire, maintain, and enhance their skills in a state-of-the-art, high-fidelity training environment. The center also extends the benefits of simulation to high schools, middle schools, youth organizations, women's organizations, foundations,

first responders, and other community members.

The Judith and Marvin Herb Family Simulation Center opened its doors in March 2021 in a state-of-theart, high-fidelity temporary simulation center at NCH. This 8,000-square-foot space made it possible to have two acute care simulation rooms, a control room, an outpatient office/clinic, a procedural skills lab, a classroom, and a debriefing room. This temporary space allowed the organization to train its learners while the permanent 12,000-square-foot space was being built with a completion date of 2023. During this time, we performed a needs assessment to cater our new Simulation Center build to the organization's and learners' needs.

Our new Simulation Center opened in January of 2023 and has two debriefing rooms, three classrooms, a fully functioning cardiovascular operating room suite, a procedural skills lab that flexes into another operating room suite, an outpatient clinic room, a moulage room, a green room for our standardized patient program/actors, a labor and delivery/NICU simulation room, an ICU/Emergency Department simulation room, two other flex simulation rooms, two large control rooms, and an Immersive Interactive room by ECHO Healthcare. The Simulation Center team takes pride in enhancing the learner's environment into a realistic clinical setting. The team can replicate almost any clinical or nonclinical setting, providing the highest realism possible.

MESSAGE FROM THE MEDICAL DIRECTOR

2024 WAS A VERY ENGAGED AND SUCCESSFUL YEAR for the Judith and Marvin Herb Family Simulation Center at NCH.

Some of the highlights and accomplishments are listed below:

- The second year in a row recognized in Beckers Healthcare: Health systems with top simulation/ education programs.
- Grand Rounds at NCH May 2024: In-flight medical emergencies: What you need to know! Simulation Competition. A hybrid grand rounds with didactics including the most common medical emergencies occurring on a plane, the contents of the emergency kit, followed by 2 in-flight medical simulations on the auditorium stage. Then, it was reviewed by a panel of debriefers, and the audience voted on the winner.







- Dr. Harrington delivered an invited lecture at the national ACOI (American College of Osteopathic Internists) conference, entitled "Breathing Life into Learning. The Evolution of Simulation Training in Pulmonary and Critical Care."
- Publication in Cereus, Level Up Your Residency: Can a Novel Two Week Simulation Rotation Really *Make a Difference.* Collaboration between the simulation team and the transitional year residency.
- The center acquired two new mannequins: a Laerdal ALS high-fidelity mannequin devoted to code team training optimization, generously donated by Barbara Morrison, and a Laerdal high-fidelity Nursing Ann geriatric mannequin, generously donated by Bill and Lynn Martin, for internal medicine

resident and nursing training, focused on scenario training, including neurological and cardiology. Increased utilization of the mixed reality immersive room for both wellness and interactive scenario

- training with an element of gamification.
- allowing improved planning and execution of percutaneous cardiac valvular procedures.

The Simulation Center has seen continued growth, with 5,077 learners, more than 20,000 learner hours, and 703 classes. This includes expanded in-situ simulation training, including mock codes in the inpatient units at both campuses and the operating room, labor and delivery, and OB emergencies in mom and baby at North Naples WCP.



DOUG HARRINGTON, DO, FCCP Medical Director

Dr. Doug Harrington has been at NCH since 2003. He is a practicing Pulmonary and Critical Care Physician, as well as the Medical Director of the NCH Simulation Center and the Associate Program Director of the Internal Medicine Residency Program. Dr. Harrington trained in Internal Medicine, Pulmonary, and Critical Care at the Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit. He also holds appointments as an Associate Professor of Medicine at the University of Central Florida and as an Adjunct Assistant Professor of Medicine at the Mayo Clinic. Dr. Harrington has been awarded multiple Excellence in Teaching Awards. Dr. Harrington is the driving force behind the development of the NCH Simulation Center, following a one-year sabbatical/fellowship at the Mayo Clinic in Simulation Medicine from 2019 to 2020. Dr. Harrington's interests include incorporating simulation training in postgraduate residency programs, multidisciplinary simulation with high-performing teams, situational awareness, and optimization of infrequent high-risk events, and innovative use of technology integration in simulation education.





INNOVATIONS & TECHNOLOGY

PUBLIC SAFETY DE-ESCALATION AND TASER DEPLOYMENT SIMULATION TRAINING

All of the public safety officers have been given tasers for the safety of our staff and patients. The public safety officers go through a rigorous training program where we perform high-level simulation training, deploying real tasers and utilizing standardized patient actors that they will have to de-escalate during a crisis event.

HR LEADERSHIP COMMUNICATION TRAINING

Leaders were our Simulation Center's third biggest user in 2024. Human Resources has put together several high-level communication scenarios where actors from The Naples Players have been tapped to recreate realistic scenarios where leaders have to utilize communication skills.

CARDIAC ECHO DEPT STERILE FIELD TRAINING

Echo Techs simulated an echocardiogram in our Steve and Julie Vanderboom Cardiac Operating Room while a simulation patient was undergoing a cardiac procedure.

POCUS TRAINING WITH TAMPA ANESTHESIA RESIDENTS

Tampa Anesthesia resident utilized our Simulation Center to get expert training on our POCUS simulators.

TEAM HEALTH PROVIDER TRAINING

This year, Team Health held their quarterly provider training in our Simulation Center, performing high-risk low-frequency emergency simulations, including third-degree burns.

IMPELLA TRANSPORT WITH FIRST RESPONDERS AND CARDIAC CATH LAB

This multidisciplinary simulation training started with Collier County EMS first responders picking up a patient who was having a STEMI. The patient was transported to North ED and then to the cath lab. During the cath lab, the team had to emergency transport the patient downtown to CVICU on an Impella. The patient went into cardiac arrest en route, and the first responders and the cath lab staff had to work together in an ambulance to resuscitate the patient while watching the Impella pump. The scenario ended at Baker CVICU with the cardiac team.







INTER-AGENCY COLLABORATION

WE TAKE IMMENSE PRIDE in the unique partnerships we've built with our community through inter-agency collaboration. As a simulation center, we are privileged to serve not only healthcare professionals but also a diverse range of community users. These courses, workshops, and presentations included high-risk simulation training, immersive room training, workshops introducing students to healthcare, tours, moulage workshops, virtual dissection training, hands on CPR, emergency first aid courses, and education on LifeVac anti-choking device to the local public-school nurses and health aides.














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
